
The Book Corner

Florida Mayflower Junior Program

This is a program where Colony members may register your children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews, grandniece and grandnephews who are under 18 as Junior Mayflower Members. The child must be related to you by blood. The cost is a one-time charge of \$30.00 for each child. Your Junior will receive a beautiful certificate representing your Pilgrim(s) and recognition by the Florida Society. The Junior Membership is ceremonial and does not confer adult membership. When the Junior reaches 18, they may submit to regular adult membership. Currently, the Florida Society pays the Application fee for Junior members converting to adult membership. The fee waiver program is reviewed periodically and is subject to change without notice. If you are interested in registering your Junior, please contact me and I will coordinate a membership application. Your Junior need not be a resident of Florida but must be a blood relative. Our Colony currently has 92 Junior Members and is one of the most active Colonies in Florida.

Historian's Words of Wisdom - Patriots to Passenger Program

If you have a proven Patriot(s) from either the Daughters of American Revolution (DAR) or the Sons of the American Revolution, there is a program from the General Society of Mayflower Descendants (GSMD) that tracks Patriots to see if they also are direct descendants of a Mayflower passenger. This may be a way for you to see if you have an additional Mayflower passenger!

The Patriots to Passenger Project is a growing published list of Revolutionary War Patriots who descend from Mayflower passengers. The intent is to build a bridge between lineage societies. Many Mayflower Society members are also members of other lineage societies.

The Patriots to Passenger Project is a way to help others discover their link to a Mayflower passenger and benefits existing members with possible discovery of additional Mayflower lines of descent they can then submit as supplemental applications.

Please note generations are only documented to the 5th generation in the Mayflower Silver Books (a few may include additional generations). Documentation beyond the first five generations may be required and proof from other lineage societies may or may not be considered acceptable by The Mayflower Society.

If you have a DAR or SAR Patriot that you would like to check for a possible Mayflower connection, I'm happy as your Colony Historian to check the database for you. Please contact me at kbressner@gmail.com The best information is a copy of your approved DAR or SAR application as names are often common.

This program was developed by Muriel Cushing, former Florida Mayflower Historian and represents a great deal of volunteer research as a member benefit to you!



Mayflower Tidbits

The Thanksgiving Debates



It is argued that the first Pilgrim Thanksgiving feast probably lasted for 3 days and held during Michaelmas on the 29th of September, or in October, to give thanks for the harvest and celebrate the beginning of fall. But over the years, the concept of a first Thanksgiving was hotly contested by Virginia, Florida, Texas and Massachusetts with each claiming to have the earliest celebrations.

In 1846, Sara Josepha Buell Hale campaigned to make Thanksgiving a National Holiday which would take place on the last Thursday in November. As a woman ahead of her time, she also proposed that churches raise money so that slaves could be purchased, educated, and returned to their homes in Africa, and the completion of the Bunker Hill Monument. Today, she is probably best known as the author of the nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb".

Finally, in the middle of the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that a National Day of Thanksgiving was to be celebrated on the 26th of November, the last Thursday in November 1863. This proclamation was written by his Secretary of State, William Seward, and dated the 3rd of October 1863, being the 88th Proclamation of President Abraham Lincoln. This new holiday replaced Evacuation Day, which was a holiday celebrating the day the British Army left New York City.

However, this also caused future consternation because people realized that sometimes there were five Thursdays in November. After 300 years of argument and debate, The National Holiday of Thanksgiving was finally codified to take place on the fourth Thursday of November.

THE MAYFLOWER SHIP: BEFORE & AFTER THE PILGRIMS

Most historians agree that probably the only passengers to ever charter the ship the Mayflower for a journey were the Pilgrims. As we all know they did not own the ship, but simply leased it for their voyage. Why they selected a ship designed to carry cargo is somewhat of a mystery. However, it is known that Captain Christopher Jones at one time owned as much as 25% of this vessel. Regardless, records have been found to reveal some interesting facts about this ship both before and after the Pilgrims sailed on it to America in 1620.

Captain Jones commanded the Mayflower for at least twelve years prior to 1620. Historians report that the ship was built about 1605, and it was specifically designed to be a cargo vessel. "It was a large ship for that period and was rated as a '180 ton' vessel; this term refers to a wine barrel and indicates the number of wine barrels or casks a ship could carry." (Muttart and Ashley, 2006) Apparently the wine casks often leaked and would tend to hide the foul order that most ships had that carried perishable foods. [Perhaps this may have made the Pilgrims' voyage a bit more tolerable?]

Before the voyage of our Pilgrims Captain Jones often transported English yard goods (woolens) to the continent of Europe. On his return trips to England, he then usually carried cargoes of wine for wealthy William Speight, a highly successful English wine dealer who "exchanged thousands of yards of raw cloth to pay for French or Spanish wine." (Bunker, 2020)

After the Mayflower left Plymouth Colony on April 5, 1621/22, records do not show that this ship ever made any later voyages to the colonies. Instead, it returned to being a cargo ship carrying goods to and from Europe. Sadly "In 1624 the then owners of the Mayflower [Captain Jones had died in 1622] reported that the ship was 'in ruins' and was put up for auction. The auction list in the Public Records Office in London indicates that the ship was sold in pieces with the timbers bringing the most money at a time when England had a shortage of wood." (Muttart and Ashley, 2006) Timbers of old ships

were in demand at the time for use in the construction of buildings, primarily barns.

It was once reported that the timber from the Mayflower was used to build a specific barn in Buckinghamshire, once popularly known as the Mayflower or Jordan Barn where special events (weddings, conferences) were held. This "story" has since been disapproved by nearly all serious Mayflower historians- - -but it does seem like a fitting and "happy ending" for a vessel so important and special to our Pilgrim history!
