Revolution 250

The PBS documentary series *The American Revolution*, premieres on Sunday, November 16, 2025. Directed by filmmaker Ken Burns, this is a six-part, 12-hour miniseries that explores the eight-year war for independence and the founding of the United States of America. An effort was made to include perspectives from diverse groups of the era, including indigenous people, women, slaves, Loyalists, and Caribbean influences.

The broadcast will air over six consecutive nights (November 16 - 21) from 8-10:00 ET (check local listings) on PBS stations. The full series becomes available to stream beginning Sunday, November 16 at PBS.org and on the PBS app. The program, in development for eight years, has been timed to coincide with the 250th anniversary of the war's start in 1775 (over a year before the Declaration of Independence).



The script is by Geoffrey C. Ward, a longtime collaborator of Ken Burns. A companion book, *The American Revolution An Intimate History* by Geoffrey C. Ward and Ken Burns, published by Alfred A. Knopf on November 11, 2025, includes essays from established historians plus timely artwork, pamphlets, and maps.

FOREFATHER'S DAY IN PLYMOUTH: CELEBRATED EACH YEAR ON DECEMBER 22 SINCE 1769

Have you heard of the Old Colony Club? This organization has kept the importance of December 22 foremost in Mayflower history for 250 years. Before the nation-wide celebration of our traditional Thanksgiving Day (begun about 1863), Old Colony Club members honored their forefathers in a special salute on the day the Pilgrims arrived in Plymouth. This tradition continues today.

The Old Colony Club, reported to be the oldest men's club in the western hemisphere, was formed in January 1769 by Isaac Lothrop, Pelham Winslow, Thomas Lothrop, Thomas Mayhew, Elkanah Cushman, John Thomas, Edward Winslow, Jr., and John Watson. On December 22 of that year, they first commemorated the landing of eighteen Pilgrims on Plymouth Rock via a ferry shallop from the Mayflower. This celebration, known as "Old Colony Day" (and later as "Forefathers Day") was erroneously established on December 22 instead of December 21 when the group inaccurately adjusted the landing date to the



Gregorian calendar implemented in 1752. [Edited from *Wikipedia*]

The tradition continues. Each year on December 22, Colony Club Members conduct an early (6 a.m.) celebratory parade, marching to Cole's Hill to give speeches honoring the Pilgrims' faith, courage and fortitude. At the conclusion, they shoot a cannon three times over Plymouth Rock, shouting "Hip, Hip Hurrah!" as they raise their hats to remember our precious Pilgrims.

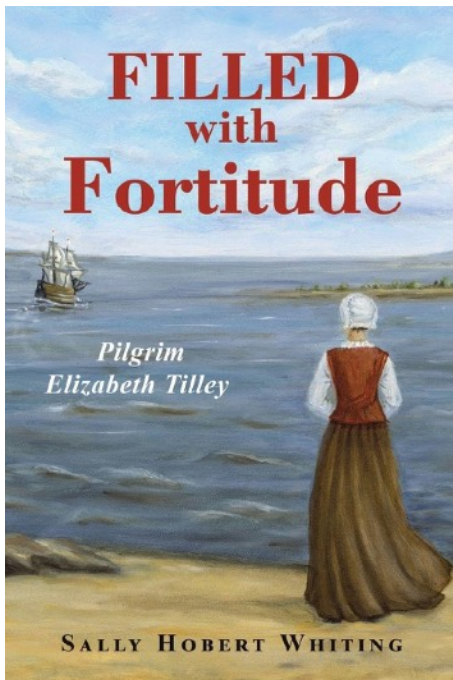
The Book Corner 2025

FILLED with Fortitude: Pilgrim Elizabeth Tilley

Although you may think your library is filled with Mayflower history books of all kinds, you may still have many unanswered questions about the challenges of the preparations and struggles involved in the actual voyage and settlement of the Plymouth Colony in New England.

Sally Hobert Whiting spent six years of research using her personal life experiences in farming, sailing, teaching, writing, publishing, and gathering history to write this fascinating historical fiction novel about Elizabeth Tilley. The definition of “fortitude” is courage and strength in the face of pain, adversity, or hardship. Elizabeth Tilley, a passenger on the Mayflower voyage in 1620, was the epitome of fortitude! Through her strong faith and by pure necessity, she learned to nurse and give comfort to others. Orphaned at 13 years old, Elizabeth Tilley went on to marry Pilgrim John Holland, eventually having 10 children and 88 grandchildren.



Filled with Fortitude is a book for the millions of her cousins today — and for anyone who recognizes the courage and strength of the Pilgrims — to read and enjoy!

It's About Time That Little Brother Did Something Useful

Proving a family line for a lineage society is often a challenge, especially when vital records for your target person are lacking. Here are the basic three rules I follow for all Mayflower applications. These rules are also can be used with other lineage societies:

Three goals or proofs are needed for each generation in an application:

1. One or more documents (birth, marriage, or death records, etc.) must name parents in a way that connects each generation with the next.
2. One or more documents must show that it is the same person at marriage who is listed as a child of the parents.
3. Places and dates are supported in the documents.

In some cases, I've been able to prove a Mayflower line using vital records of siblings when the vital records of the target Mayflower line carrier were either lost in a fire or never collected. Consider looking for sibling records, especially birth and marriage records that show parent information. I prefer birth and marriage records over death records because death records often contain mistakes by grieving relatives.

As an example, let's take a little brother who was born in 1858 in New York and the target person, also a male was born in 1856. The 1860 Federal Census listed members of a household by their names, ages, and sex, also showing the state in which the household members were born. Although this information is not as good as the 1880 Federal Census — which was the first national census that included the relations of the household members to each other — it's a starting point. In the case of New York and several other states around the 1860's, state census records reveal relations among the household members and the county in NY where the family members were born. Birth Records in New York were not generally available until 1880 so it is unlikely we will find the little brother's birth record, either. However, the two censuses we have for them (1860 Federal and 1865 New York) show them living in the same household with their parents (and maybe, with some luck, with grandparents).

The little brother's marriage record becomes important, especially if he stayed in New York. Let's assume he did and married at age 23 in 1881. Happily, in New York, marriage records became generally available by 1880. If this record were found, it would include the couple's ages, places of birth, dates of birth, and full parent names. Remember to look also at the witnesses on the marriage record: perhaps the older brother is listed, as well. The marriage record of the younger brother, tied with census records, is a good way to "back into" birth information for the target older brother.

In the case of Mayflower applications, I also include a "Historian Note" in the birth line of the Mayflower carrier to demonstrate the relationship of the brothers using the two census records and the younger brother's marriage record.

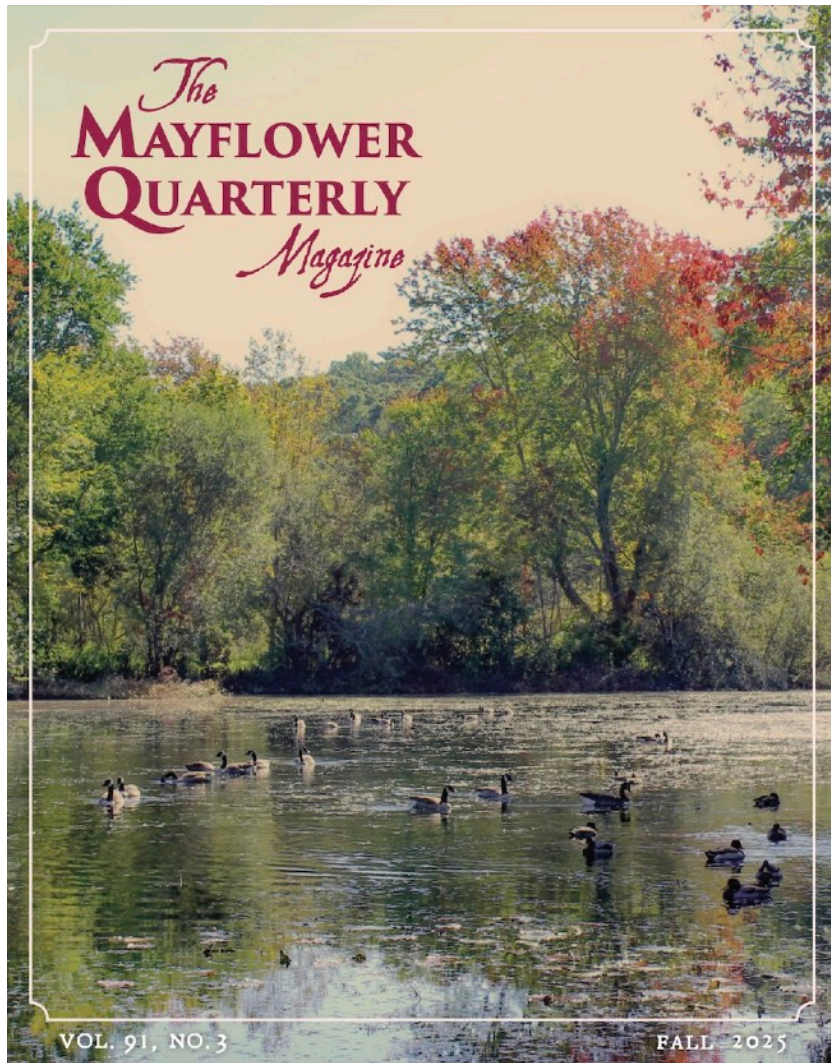
Although a sibling's death certificate can also be used to help identify and prove parentage of a Mayflower line carrier, information about parents and birth on that document is often in error. Concentrate on looking for a sibling's marriage record, or, if available, a sibling's birth record. In short, consider "asking" that younger brother for assistance in ancestry proof, since he may not have done much else besides being a pest!

The General Society of Mayflower Descendants 3rd Prize – \$4,000

Two GSMD Native American Scholarships – \$1,300 each

Florida Mayflower Junior Program

DYK that as a Colony member, you may register your children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews, and grandnieces and grandnephews who are under 18 as Junior Mayflower Members. The child must be related to you by blood. The cost is a one-time charge of \$30.00 for each child. Your Junior will receive a beautiful certificate representing your Pilgrim(s) and recognition by the Florida Society. The Junior Membership is ceremonial and does not confer adult membership. When Juniors reach 18, they may submit regular adult membership applications. Currently, the Florida Society pays the application fee for Junior members converting to adult membership; however, the fee-waiver program is reviewed periodically and is subject to change without notice. In the past three years, five Hopkins Colony junior members have become full adult members taking advantage of the application fee waiver. If you are interested in registering your junior, please contact me, and I will coordinate the junior membership application. Your junior need not be resident of Florida but must be a blood relative to you. With 91 junior members, our colony has one of the most active Junior Member Programs in Florida.
